# SRTI Virtual Wrap-Up





Public lands in the United States hold the creation stories, burial grounds, and ceremonies of Indigenous people who were killed or forcibly removed from their ancestral homes during territorial acquisition.

Many tribes, comprised of different bands, live in the Eastern Sierra region, caring for their native lands as they coexist with the ongoing impacts of colonization. Past or present tribes and bands associated with the region that this effort is aware of include, but are not limited to, the Miwok, Mono Lake Kutzadika'a, Mono/Monache, Nüümü (Paiute), Newe (Shoshone), Timbi-Sha, Utu Utu Gwaitu Paiute, and Washoe.

Two Nüümü terms describe the region and provide important context to ideas offered in this presentation. The first is Pamidu Toiyabe (Western Mountains), and the other, more widely known, place name is Payahuunadü (The Place Where Water Flows).

This acknowledgement is an invitation to all organizations, residents, and visitors to recognize the way this history has shaped the present as all parties work together in anticipation of a better future.



































































THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU) is made and entered into by and between the parties who have executed this MOU. Each entity who executes this MOU as shown in Attachment A is a "PARTY" to this MOU.

#### RECITALS


- A. The Eastern Sierra Sustainable Recreation Partnership (ESSRP) is a unique partnership among local Eastern Sierra governments, state agencies, federal agencies, and sovereign tribes. The municipalities may include, but are not limited to: the City of Bishop and the Town of Mammoth Lakes, California municipal corporations. The municipal utilities may include, but are not limited to: the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power. The counties may include but are not limited to: the Counties of Alpine, Inyo, and Mono, political subdivisions of the State of California. The state agencies may include, but are not limited to: the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), a department within the State of California. Other public entities may include but are not limited to: the Eastern Sierra Council of Governments, a California ipoint powers authority. The federal agencies may include but are not limited to: the National Park Service (NPS) at Death Valley National Park, Sequoia & Kings Canyon National Parks, Vosemite National Parks, Devils Postpile National Monument, and Manzanar National Historic Site; the Bureau of Land Management (BLM); and the United States Forest Service (USFS) at Inyo National Forest and Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest.
- B. On July 18, 2017, the Mono County Board of Supervisors and the Mammoth Lakes Town Council held a joint meeting to initiate the ESSRP.
- C. On July 19, 2018, the Town of Mammoth Lakes, Mono County, USFS Inyo National Forest, and USFS Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest entered into a Non-Funded Challenge Cost Share Agreement (Cost Sharing Agreement). The Cost Sharing Agreement sets forth the ESSRP goals, including the creation of healthy forests and watersheds, fire-safe communities, and sustainable local economies. The Cost Sharing Agreement intends to reduce duplication of efforts and harness the expertise of employees of all parties as well as maximize cash and non-cash contributions leading to joint accomplishment of work.
